

Oxford Announces ADA Transition Plan Project

OXFORD, NC – The City of Oxford, NC is creating an Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) Transition Plan, furthering its commitment to accessibility Citywide.

“The City of Oxford believes that City right-of-way, parks, facilities, and services should be accessible to all community members,” stated Stephan Blasko, Public Works Director.

The Transition Plan process involves an accessibility barrier self-assessment of City-owned infrastructure, facilities, parks, programs, and services. This includes assessing 40 miles of City sidewalk and 11 public facilities for barriers. Barriers are determined by ADA regulations and guidance, with examples including the potential lack of curb ramps at street corners or older designs for facility parking lots and doorways.

Key to the ADA Transition Plan process is public input. Community collaboration enhances the ADA Transition Plan by ensuring the focus isn't just on accessibility barriers but also on the experiences of those with disabilities in the community.

The citizens of Oxford are encouraged to take the survey below and encourage others to as well. The survey takes approximately 10 minutes to complete.
